## Streaming video er firefox extension

Now that Mozilla has locked Firefox 3's feature set, it is clear that the new browser iteration will make some extensions obsolete. Firefox 3 includes functionality out-of-the-box that you could only get with add-ons for. Let's look at five extensions you might not need when you switch to Firefox 3.NoSquint: Never again enlarge the text on that web page with the tiny font size. Firefox 3's new Text Only zoom feature doesn't enlarge images and is smart enough to remember your text size setting per site when you revisit. Google Gears: While offline support for web applications is still a turn off, Firefox 3 does have support built in and ready for web app authors to turn it on, effectively eliminating Google Gears. It will be very interesting to see Gears's fate in the face of Firefox 3 offline web app support, and which web apps support that. Overall, it's great news for users who want their data, whether they're online or not. Search box format: Sometimes it's the little things that make us happy, like a search box that can be as big or as small as you want without manually editing CSS. In Firefox 3, just grab the separator between the address bar and the search box and drag and drop to the width you desire. It doesn't expand automatically when you type, however, as Searchbar Autosizer does; maybe in Firefox 4.DownThemAll: Ok, so Firefox 3's enhanced download manager certainly doesn't offer all the features DownThemAll offers, but it includes dTa's main feature, which is the ability to resume downloads even after you restart your browser or lost your network connection. We still love dTa for all the other download acrobatics it can do; see more information on how to charge your Firefox downloads with DownThemAll.Better Gmail and other Mailto: handler add-ons: Pre-Firefox 3, to compose your web-based email, you need an extension like Better Gmail, toolbar or a third-party program like the Gmail Notifier. No more: Now Firefox 3 can register web-based protocol handlers, meaning it can open certain types of links (such as iCal calendars and email addresses) in web apps of your choice (such as Gmail or 30 Boxes.) It seems that Yahoo! Mail is the only web-based email handler registered at this time (go to the Applications tab in the Preferences Mozilla see that) and 30 boxes for iCal, but without a doubt, these choices will expand. BearBear is a unique type of note-taking app designed to make it easier for Mac users to jot down notes on the go. Creates to-do lists, gives yourself reminders, and outlines concepts for future brainstorming sessions. It comes with many different inline styles, allowing you to customize your notes to your personal preferences, and remember the context in which you wrote them. The core version is free, with a \$14.99 per year version available as well. Download: Bear4. HazelHazel by noodlesoft is an automated organizational tool designed for Mac that lets you automatically organize your files based on custom rules you want to create. For example, you set it to move unaffected items from one folder to another folder labeled action items if they're not addressed within a week. It can save you hours of organization over the course of a few weeks. A single license is a flat \$32.Download: noodlesoft5. AlfredAlfred is an all-in-one app designed to save you time with Mac shortcuts and convenient custom actions. You use it in different ways. For example, you can access Alfred's clipboard memory so you don't copy and paste the same material more and more, or set up custom workflows to automate some of your most repetitive tasks. TextExpanderTextExpander does exactly what the name suggests: Types a short text snippet and automatically expands that text. For example, you create a custom extension that allows you to create a full paragraph that you repeatedly type by simply typing a unique abbreviation.
